## Week 10 - CALLING OF THE TWELVE (Luke 5:1-11, 27-32, pp. 75-81)

As we read and studied the call of the Twelve, two themes appeared repeatedly in our devotions.

First we were reminded that the call of Christ is a <u>personal call</u> for each of us. In the waters of Baptism, the Hoy Eucharist, and the Word of Absolution, Christ personally comes to you to forgive your sins and give you life. It is <u>for you</u>. But it is not ONLY for you. It is also for those whom God has given to you to love and to serve.

That's the second theme we saw repeatedly: <u>mentorship</u>. The disciples were not only saved by Christ, but also mentored and formed by Him. They, in turn, mentored and discipled others. And we, too, are called to make disciples.
